THURSDAY MORNING ROUNDTABLE

Goals

Founded in March 1965 by University College as a public service program, the Thursday Morning Roundtable is a weekly speaker series bringing together a mix of citizens to learn about and discuss a variety of concerns. TMR's stated purpose is to function as a "channel of communication for civic leaders in the Syracuse metropolitan area, providing an opportunity for citizens sharing special responsibilities for the progressive development of the area to exchange ideas and opinions on important public issues and problems." After 45 years, TMR remains one of the community's most valued vehicles for improved civic literacy, and serves as a catalyst for community dialogue and improvement.

Program

TMR meets Thursday mornings, 26 weeks a year, from September through April. Most meetings take place at Drumlins, Syracuse University's meeting center at 800 Nottingham Road, Syracuse. Members arrive between 7:45 and 8:15 a.m. for coffee and pastries. The program begins promptly at 8:15 and ends at 9:15 a.m. Most members use the time before and after the formal session to meet and network with other members.

Topics are usually subjects of community concern, including local, state, national, and international issues. Presenters speak for approximately the first half-hour.

Members are encouraged to ask questions of the speaker in the second half-hour. Monthly schedules of speakers are posted on the TMR web site and are e-mailed to members. Programs are taped for later broadcast on WCNY-FM radio.

Membership

Much of the value of TMR stems from the mix of participants and viewpoints. One of TMR's objectives is to assemble a cross section of citizens from business, government, and various types of nonprofit organizations. Regular attendance is expected and is considered critical to achieving the program's objectives. It is important to not limit attendance to particular topics or speakers, as the greatest benefit often comes from presentations on topics that may not be familiar or of perceived personal interest.

A prospective member is considered on these criteria:

- Brings diversity of viewpoint to the Roundtable
- Exhibits interest in a broad range of social and public issues
- Has a reputation as a "doer" and will use information gained through TMR in the community
- Is a contributor to community endeavors
- Indicates commitment to regular attendance

Onondaga Citizens League

While there is no membership fee for TMR, members are expected to become members of the Onondaga Citizens League, an independent nonprofit organization created by TMR in 1978. This nonpartisan, tax-exempt organization conducts an in-depth study of an important community issue each year, culminating in a report of findings and recommendations for action. OCL dues are \$50 a year for individuals; many organizations and businesses are sustaining members at higher levels. Individuals are also able to participate in OCL studies, through membership on various committees or attendance at study sessions. More information is on the web: onondagacitizensleague.org.

TMR Scholarship Fund for Part-Time UC Students

To commemorate TMR's 25th anniversary, and to honor TMR's founder, the Levi L. Smith Scholarship Fund was established in 1990. Dr. Ernest Sarason led the fundraising campaign for the endowment, which funds two six-credit scholarships for adult students at University College each year. Contributions to the scholarship fund are welcome at any time.

TMR Community Service Award

TMR presents an annual award to a citizen of the community whose exemplary good works have gone largely unrecognized. TMR members submit nominations, which are reviewed by an award committee.
